Validity Studies

Clinical ratings of the characteristics measured by the MACI scales. MACI did not have an Inconsistency scale. The MACI-II Invalidation scale was called the Reliability scale on the MACI.

Formerly Eating Dysfunctions, now focuses on binge eating and bulimic symptoms

Clinician ratings of the characteristics measured by the MACI-II scales
